



Elephant and Hare


One day, Elephant lit a fire near Hare's anthill and collected Hare's white ants.

“Oh no, I am not the one who collected your white ants,” replied Elephant.


“Let me go and inform all my friends about this,” said Hare.


Owl and Dove

Sadly, the ladies did not like Owl.


The ladies said Owl's head was too big and heavy.




"Dove, can I borrow your head so I can go and dance with the ladies?" Owl asked.


Snail Falls in the Porridge

"Please give some food if you can."




“Come to my home,” replied Millipede.

Snail could not eat porridge because it was poured in a calabash.


Snail struggled to get in the calabash but he failed.
